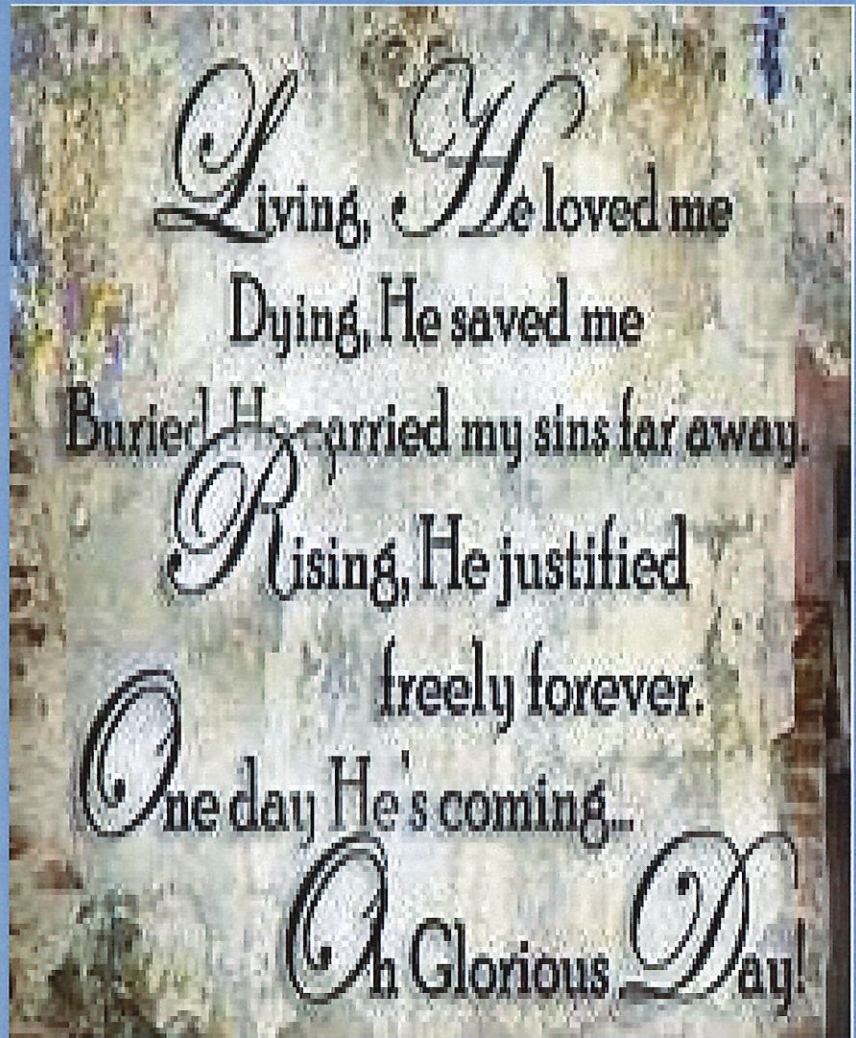

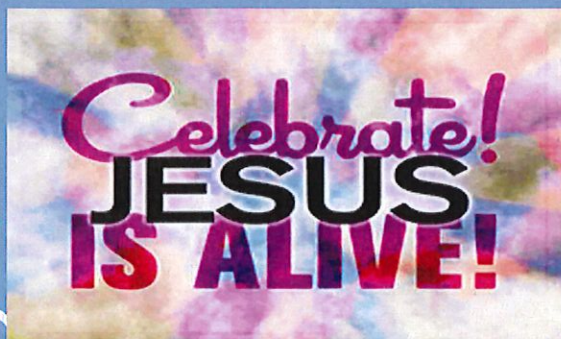

From the Pastor's Desk:

"I have become like a broken vessel." Psalm 31:12

This Lent season, the above verse is how I feel. Reflecting on my relationship with God, I realize that to sit and just be with God in silence is scary!! I know my own shortcomings and I just don't know if I can bear to hear what God and the Spirit might have to say...you know...that voice that is deep, deep down in our hearts.

There is a WONDERFUL movie Brian and I love called Joshua. It came out in 2002. The plot line is to show what Jesus' love would look like in today's world. Everything from miracles, healings, building of community, and most importantly...LOVE.

A scene that touches my heart deeply is when Joshua, played by Tony Goldwyn, gives a beautiful glass figure to one of the characters. In a moment of frustration, anger, and deep sadness, the character throws the figurine and it shatters into a million pieces. After she leaves the scene, Joshua gathers all of the glass fragments and shards, holds them lovingly in his hands, and looks to heaven. What is left is the most beautiful glass angel...showing that gathering the broken pieces of ourselves can be put back together into something more beautiful than before. I won't tell you anymore of the plot line, but will entrust it to you all to watch!

Why do I tell this story? Because at one time...or possibly many times...in our lives, we feel like a broken vessel like the Psalm above reads. We wonder if the pieces will ever go back together again. Will pieces be missing? Will we be the same as we were before? Can God really make something beautiful out of my broken life?? Do I have anything new to offer?

The answer to all those questions...YES. That is why we take time in Lent to pause and give up our broken self to the one who can make all things new...and did on the third day when He rose from the tomb!

So as we approach Easter, I would like to leave you all with a blessing written by Jan Richardson from her book *Circle of Grace*.

You hold the memory

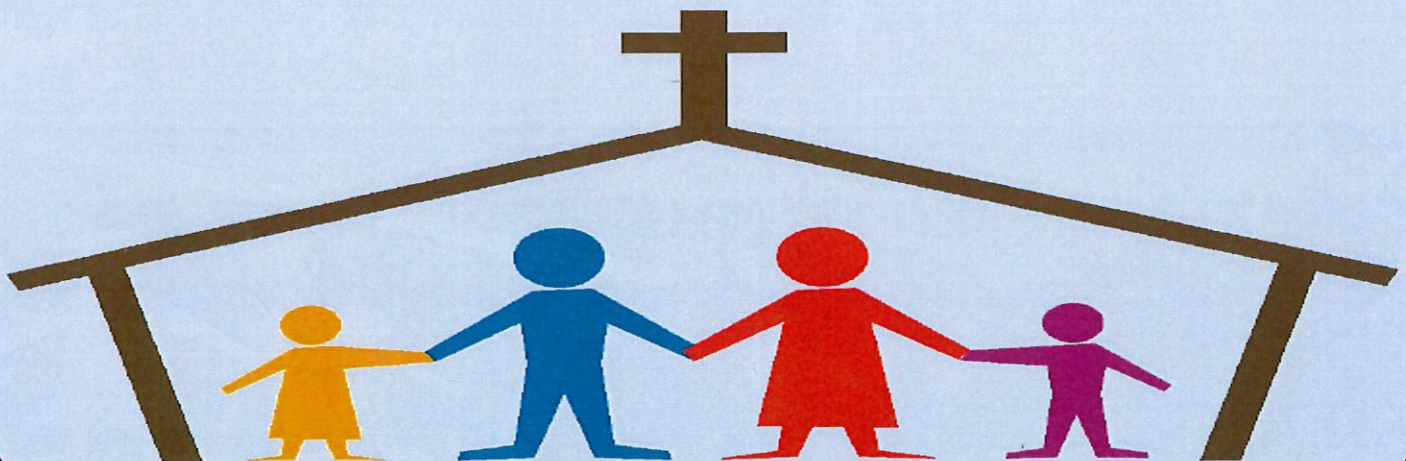

It is so hard to believe that it is already April. We have a busy month planned. Our enrollment for next year is almost completely full and we are so blessed to have such a wonderful Preschool family.

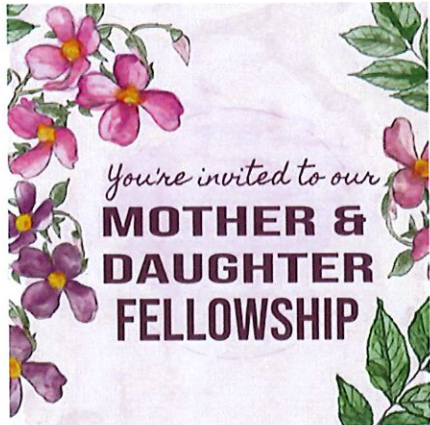

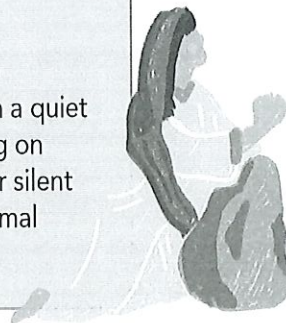

Day of Preparation

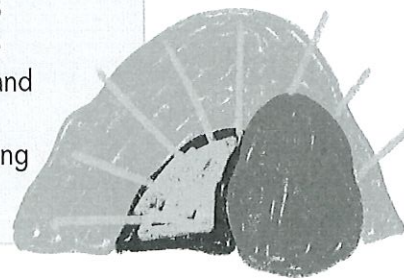
- Reading: Luke 23:50-56

Holy Humor / Laughter Sunday

Have you ever heard of Laughter Sunday? The congregation we were members of in Georgia always had a Laughter Sunday. It can also be called Holy Humor Sunday or Holy Hilarity Sunday.

The idea is to set aside one Sunday each year to celebrate God's gift of laughter and joy. This might be a new concept for many...but it does have a long and rich history in many congregations around the world. Its roots go deep in a number of Christian traditions. Let's explore a few.

Churches in the 15th century Bavaria used to celebrate the Sunday after Easter as *Risus Paschalis* ('God's Joke' or 'the Easter laugh'). Priests would deliberately include amusing stories and jokes in their sermons in an attempt to make the faithful laugh. After the service, people would gather together to play practical jokes on one another and tell funny stories. It was their way of celebrating the resurrection of Christ – the supreme joke God played on Satan by raising Jesus from the dead. The observance was officially outlawed by Pope Clement X in the 17th century. Perhaps people were having too much fun?!?

In the Orthodox tradition, people would gather on Easter Monday to tell jokes and funny stories, and to dance and eat together.

In 1988, the Fellowship of Merry Christians began encouraging churches to resurrect some of these Christian traditions – to celebrate the grace and mercy of God through the gift of laughter and joy.

On Sunday April 27, 2025, we will be celebrating Holy Humor Sunday here at St. Peter's. Usually the Sunday after Easter is known to be a "Low Sunday" because attendance is lower after the festival day. However, we will LOTS going on this day!! We will celebrate the gift of joy and laughter with one another. It will also be Preschool Sunday with the preschool students singing during the Children's Sermon. We will celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism. And we will enjoy a wonderful lunch provided by our preschool! Please join us for a fun and full day!



As the flowers bloom and the sun warms the earth, we enter the season of Easter – a time of renewal and rebirth. Renewal and rebirth are gifts. What we choose to do with our gifts is what we call stewardship. Stewardship, often associated with mindful care, is a cornerstone of the Easter message. But have we truly grasped its profound spiritual significance within the community?

Stewardship as a Reflection of Easter's Spirit

The Easter holiday is about more than just bunnies and eggs – it's a spiritual awakening, reminding us of the ultimate act of stewardship. When Jesus chose a sacrifice that gave the gift of forgiveness to all of us. Following the biblical teachings, we are called to be stewards of the land, our money, our families, and our neighbors. Easter's story of sacrifice and rebirth challenges us to consider the depth of our commitment to these roles. Stewardship, in this sense, embodies the spirit of giving, not just from our abundance, but sometimes from our scarcity. Just as Christ gave of himself, those who celebrate Easter can find resonance in the message of sharing, selflessness, and service to others.

The Intersection of Faith and Action

For Christians, faith without works is dead, and the call to stewardship is an active one. It's about being caretakers of God's creation, considering the sustainability of our actions, and advocating for justice within our spheres of influence. What does this look like in practical terms? Perhaps it's supporting local farmers' markets to reduce carbon footprints, or it's rallying for cleaner community spaces. Maybe it's mentoring a young person, volunteering with food banks, or investing in a community garden. These acts of stewardship demonstrate a dedication to the world that Easter's message envisions – a world of solidarity and care.

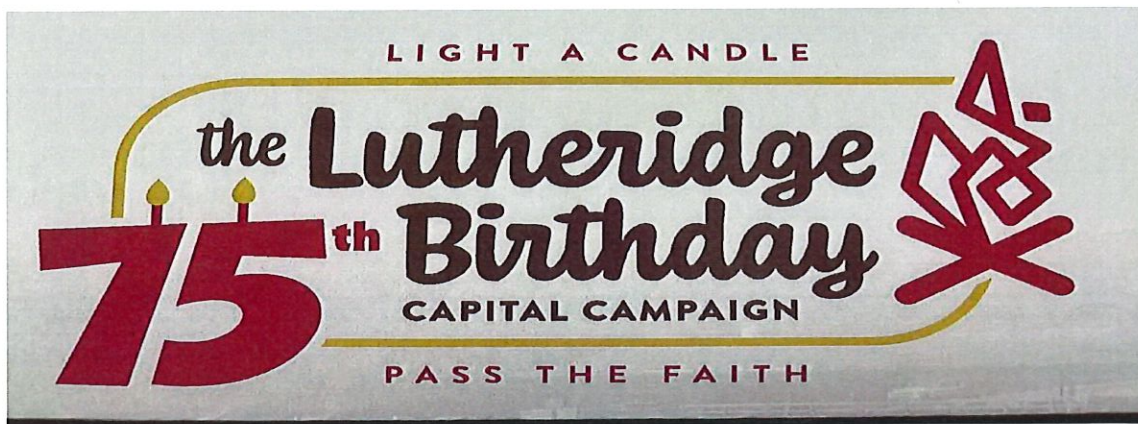
Finding Your Stewardship Path

As flowers bring color to the world, our actions can also bring vibrancy. Where can you start your journey towards meaningful stewardship? In the spirit of Easter, let's take a moment to reflect and act. Is there a neighbor you haven't checked on? A cause you haven't championed? Take Action This Easter

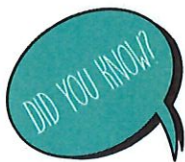
